als that were passionate about Jesus, discipleship, and having fun! I had come to UGA afraid that I would fall away from the Lord as so many others I knew, but through the ministry of Chi Alpha, I found myself growing more in my faith than ever before.

Campus pastors Michael and Elizabeth Miller, along with her peer student leaders had a tremendous impact on Rachel. During her years at Georgia she was trained to be a leader herself, developing a passion for one-on-one and small group discipleship that she continued to use after graduating from Georgia with her Master's in Speech Pathology.

"Perhaps the greatest influence of Chi Alpha in my life was to put me on a path that caused me to meet and marry my sweetheart, a full time pastor in the Assemblies of God! The investment of my campus pastors, Michael and Elizabeth Miller, and other student leaders into my life has permanently impacted me for

Christ and given me the practical tools to continue growing and reaching out to others in my secular job as a speech language pathologist and within the local church," Rachel says. "I am forever indebted to them!"

Rachel's said "sweetheart" is Cameron King, whom she married in 2002. They soon moved to Cairo, Georgia where they have served as the pastors of First Assembly of God for more than a decade.

As Rachel's career as an undergrad began to wind down the oldest of her two younger brothers, Will Arnold enrolled at Auburn. With Rachel's encouragement, Will became involved in the local chapter of Chi Alpha, then led by campus minister J.B. Stephens. Will credits the group with giving him a big picture understanding of God's heart and work in the world.

"Chi Alpha was a group of people who opened my eyes to the personal/social needs of other students from so many differ-

ent backgrounds, from football to the arts to inter-faith, international students," Will says. "The friends I have from Chi Alpha have become my lifelong fast friends and I still visit them over ten years later. We have friendships from East Asia to the East Coast and at least four continents between."

As with his sister Rachel, Will credits says his years with Chi Alpha have prepared him to lead a Spirit-filled life in the marketplace. "Perhaps most importantly, Chi Alpha instilled a sense of purpose in being about the Father's business in all employment situations even when it just means being aware and opening my ears in the innerman to discern the moment," he says.

The youngest of the Arnold siblings, John, began his freshman year at Auburn in 2002. Like Rachel and Will before him, John jumped into Chi Alpha with both feet. He said the ministry, by then under the current leadership of Josh and Ginger Hallmark, taught him a paradigm of living that "trusts, relies upon the grace, strength and activity of the Living God."

As John's undergraduate time at Auburn concluded, he answered Chi Alpha's call to "Give a year and pray about a lifetime," serving as an intern at Auburn during the 2005-2006 term. His experience led him go onto seminary to pursue a lifetime call to ministry, and he graduated from Asbury Theological seminary in 2010.

Today, John is in charge of Partner Relations with a ministry called Wellspring that teaches Christian leaders how to bring about sustained change in their own lives and domains of ministry and the marketplace.

The fruit of investments that Chi Alpha missionaries make in the lives of students are never fully realized during their time on campus. By design our corporate vision of changing the university, the marketplace, and the world extends well beyond the time and geographical boundaries of a single student's college experience.

But stories like these of the Arnold siblings underscore that we never know what God could be doing through the lives of the young men and women who walk on campus every fall. Proud father Doug Arnold says, "I believe that Chi Alpha provided for my kids during their college days a level of intimate fellowship and accountability with people who wanted to live their faith. Chi Alpha inspired them and trained them to walk out their faith."

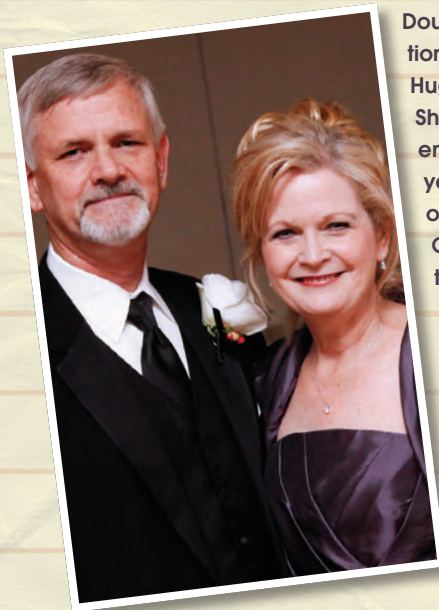
Lord and Savior.

WHAT SHOULD JESUS WEAR TO CHI ALPHA?

“Dad, Jesus in Khakis is fine for the suburbs, but in New York City you need Jesus to show up in camo.” I’ll never forget that expression for two reasons. First, it was the cry of my daughter’s heart, and second, it’s true. Alisha was almost 18 when she moved to New York. She had dreamed for years of a career in professional dance. And she prepared for at least a decade in local Portland-area studios, through the Joffrey Ballet programs, and a Juilliard summer intensive.

And now, all of those plans lie in ruins. After nearly a decade, the company with which she worked to earn a contract told her that it wasn’t going to happen. I could feel the pain from nearly 3,000 miles away as if it was my own. Much of her identity was taken away with a simple word: “No.” To Alisha, it seemed like a robust Jesus was pretty far away.

Even so, I’m convinced God doesn’t waste pain. He didn’t waste His Son’s. It was redemptive, and in a much more personal sense, so was Alisha’s. She decided a change of venue was in order and traded New York for San Francisco. She also moved from classical ballet to contemporary dance. For a season, she felt her passion renewed, and though it was an important time of transition, ultimately it wasn’t enough.

When your child is struggling, it’s easy to feel helpless, especially when they’re old enough that specific direction has to give way to persuasion. So, you pray. You pray from 3,000 miles away. You pray from 700 miles away, or from the next room. You ask God to intervene. You ask Him for the right person, a divine appointee, to show up for your child and graciously point him or her to Jesus. You pray hard with your wife for a child you love with all of your heart.

God began to answer our prayers in Alisha’s freshman year at Stanford University.

After meeting a ballet mistress who was an alumna, Alisha decided to apply to the school. She declared confidently God told her she would get

in. As it turns out, she was right. That first fall term, she dutifully joined an inter-denominational Christian Fellowship. Though Alisha’s adult relationship with Christ may have had its ups and downs, it was always passionate, and she had been reared in the Foursquare Church’s Spirit-filled tradition. The disaffected dryness of that first fellowship left her wanting.

Then in her sophomore year, Alisha met a friend from the Stanford chapter of Chi Alpha who invited her to one of their weekly meetings. She began to attend, and as she did, the Lord began the delicate process of healing her from a series of deep-seated wounds. Her mother and I could tell God was up to something.

She found the joy of her salvation again, and for the first time in a long time, her first love was Jesus. The Holy Spirit began to reorder all she was, and all she believed herself to be, so that her identity was truly “in Christ.” She rediscovered a precious childlike trust in Jesus that had become a bit of memory.

Her mother and I are grateful for the deeply affective and faithful ministry of the Stanford Chi Alpha chapter where Alisha now serves. She was an active member of the fellowship throughout her undergraduate years, and is now coming on staff as a full-time missionary to the students at Stanford. Her mother and I couldn’t be more proud of her. She’ll be making an impact on the future leaders of business and politics around the world. It’s hard to overestimate the ripple effect of that mission field. And we have Chi Alpha to thank for both the spiritual investment made in our daughter and the opportunity for her to minister.

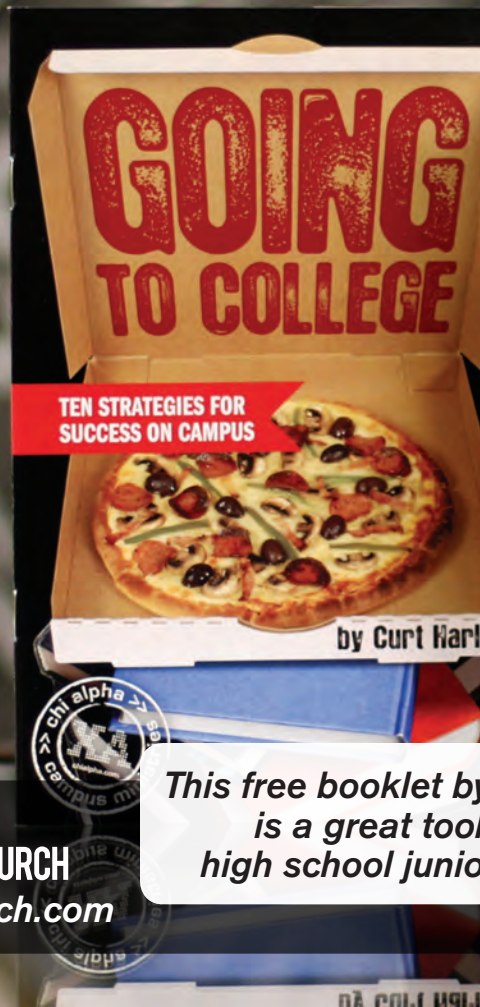
