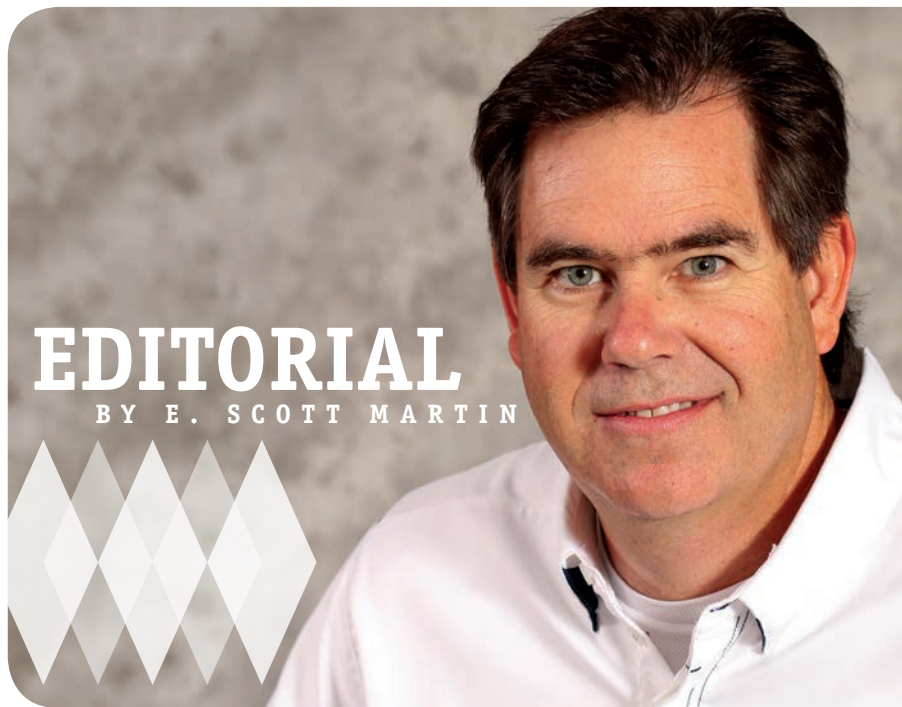

We may not hear their cries first hand, or be able to provide for every need. We can reach out with what we have, from a heart that is stirred by His love.

FeedONE offers a unique opportunity for Chi Alpha to interact with their college community. Whether partnering together in raising awareness or having a joint fundraiser, feedONE gives students a starting point to new conversations on campus. We've already had testimonies of student clubs contacting Chi Alpha about feedONE, wanting to partner together. At one university, a professor referenced their high regard for Chi Alpha's work with feedONE during their class! The potential is limitless, and as a local ministry you can decide what works best for you. We've had ministries try everything from small groups competing to raise the most money, walk through displays on campus, to a shabby chic prom party. It's a great chance for students to brainstorm and strategize how they can make new connections on campus.

FeedONE is not another activity to add our campus ministry calendar. It is a way to let others feel Jesus' heartbeat, to know they are loved, and that someone knows their pain. Together Chi Alpha will feed the hungry. We will help those in need. We will offer hope to the hopeless. Because He was moved with compassion, so we will be moved.

Chi Alphans at the University of Missouri (Mizzou) were presented with feedONE in the fall of 2012 when their campus pastor, Tom Trask II, attended a Dream Session in Los Angeles the previous June. The Dream Session was with Convoy of Hope and feedONE founder Hal Donaldson. He called in a few campus pastors from around the nation to discuss the new partnership with feedONE and Chi Alpha. "As a minister, you hear a lot of good ideas that are worthy and the Lord would be pleased with, but when I was presented with this concept, God just stirred something in my heart," Trask says.

Mizzou Chi Alpha raised \$1,700 in November 2012 simply by collecting offerings in small groups. In March 2013, Mizzou Chi Alpha stepped it up a notch and encouraged students to become feedONE Ambassadors by giving \$10 a month to feed a child.

In November 2013, Mizzou Chi Alpha collected \$1,100 through small groups, but Trask wanted to give more than the \$1,700 they raised the year before. That was when the Holy Spirit spoke to him at the annual Christmas party during a white elephant gift exchange. "I saw this stupid alligator toilet paper holder get stolen over and over and over again. I knew the kids thought it was great," he says. "I really felt the Lord just say to me, 'Steal it at the end and auction it off for feedONE. Get the kids excited about what I'm doing.'"

Trask thought the alligator would go for \$50 or \$60, but God had a better plan. Students pledged matches and after the alligator was sold to the highest bidder at \$200, the group doubled what came in from small groups and raised a grand total of \$2,200 for 2013-2014. "It inspired people to give. That truly was one of the most beautiful things I've ever seen," he says.

In case you're not counting, Mizzou Chi Alpha has raised more than \$4,900 for feedONE since its beginning in 2012. "I would encourage every Chi Alpha director in America to make this the compassion arm in your ministry," Trask added. "Allow your students to be a part of what God's doing."

FEEDONE CAMPUS PARTNERSHIPS

Northern Arizona University Chi Alpha launched feedONE in the fall of 2012. We began with our Chi Alpha family in an effort to help impoverished children. We challenged students to sacrifice two Starbucks coffees a month to feed, educate, and provide clean water to a child. Passion stirred during our feedONE service as Chi Alpha students watched the meter rise with each \$10 donation. Cheers followed as students responded, and \$465 was raised—46 children were provided for as a result.

After the success of 2012, we participated again in feedONE Project 168 in 2013. The goal was for each campus to raise \$1,680 in 168 hours to feed 168 children in Nicaragua. Seeing the potential

to both feed children and to involve unchurched students, we partnered with several campus groups. Chi Alpha students joined

with the NAU International Student Club, Cardinal Key Honor Society, NAU English Club, Associated Students of NAU and Gamma Phi Beta sorority.

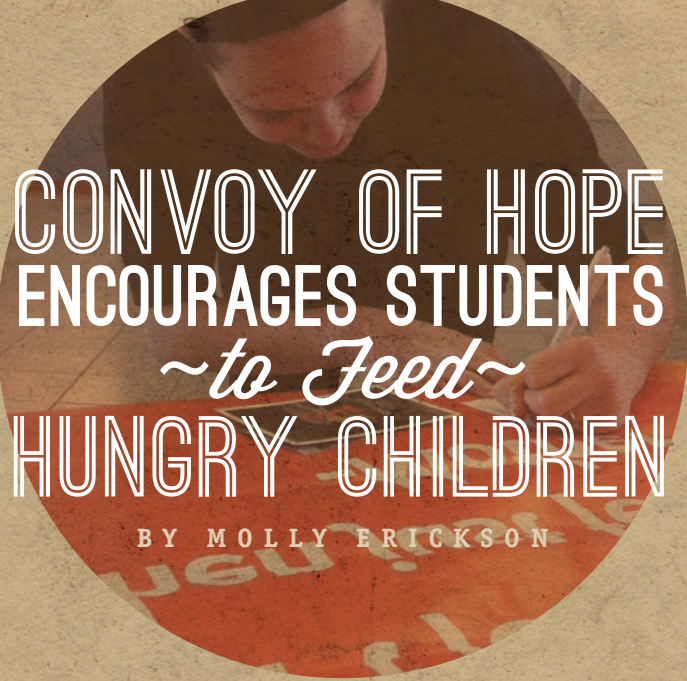
Seeing groups from other nations and religions join together to fulfill the words of Jesus changed something on campus and students noticed. “It is awesome watching students from different walks of life, whether involved in Chi Alpha or a sorority, work together to invest in a cause greater than themselves and be Christ’s hands extended,” says Chi Alpha member Rebekah Betzold. “We accomplished that with feedONE.”

During feedONE week, booths were set up daily in the student union. Students were encouraged to set aside their coffee for the day and feed one instead. Shariq Jamil, from the International Student Club, called it “eye-opening” and learned how valuable this money is to starving children. “We are so disconnected with the comforts of life in the developing world around us that we forget the plight of those in need in faraway places. It was surprising to find how far \$10 could go in supporting the children in Nicaragua,” Jamil says.

At the week’s end, NAU students raised \$1,476 and 18 people committed to give to feedONE monthly.

CONVOY OF HOPE ENCOURAGES STUDENTS ~to Feed~ HUNGRY CHILDREN

Each day, across the developing world, 66 million primary school-aged children attend classes hungry and malnourished. Such ailments delay development, stunt growth, make learning difficult and can even cause death.

Mother Teresa said, “If you can’t feed a hundred, then just feed one.” We embraced that challenge by creating feedONE, an initiative of Convoy of Hope that helps feed more than 126,000 children in 11 countries. For only \$10 per month—the cost of a pizza or a movie ticket—a child is fed for 30 days.

“Without a cause, education is an empty pursuit,” says Kimi Bui, feedONE liaison to Chi Alpha. “Today’s college student is aware of this and will commit time, energy or money to something that moves them. For many that’s feedONE.”

According to Chris Sonksen, executive director of feedONE, students from 14 major colleges have participated in the 168 Project. Their mission is to end hunger. “God has given us an amazing opportunity to engage students in acts of generosity that are directed to those in need,” says Sonksen. “We pray many more students will participate in feedONE.”

SOUTH CENTRAL SALT 2013

A record attendance of 1,300 students and staff gathered in Dallas for Chi Alpha's South Central Area SALT Conference. SALT is the winter conference to train and empower university and college students to reach their campuses for Christ. This was the largest area SALT conference in the history of Chi Alpha with students from campuses in Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas and New Mexico.

A strong call to holiness and Holy Spirit empowerment were at the core of the conference as well as many electives and practical workshops on living an evangelistic lifestyle on campus. There were powerful times in the altars where students were saved, baptized in the Holy Spirit, delivered and healed. There was even a spontaneous water baptism service in the fountain of the food court connected to the hotel.

Several dozen international students attended the SALT conference as well and were recognized and honored during the conference with many of them experiencing Christ for the first time. One student from China sent this email message shortly after he returned to his campus after coming to accept Christ during SALT:

"Thank you for inviting and bringing me to SALT. That was amazing and unforgettable. I learned much more about Christianity, especially Holy Spirit. I will keep reading Bible to learn more. Besides, I made some friends from University of Louisiana and other places. All in all, this is the best conference I have ever attended."

Students also had the chance to mingle with AG missionaries at the Chi Alpha Expeditions Lounge and discover opportunities for summer teams and giving a year to missions after graduation, as well as ministry training through Chi Alpha's internship programs.

A missions offering was received during SALT and a check was presented to Convoy of Hope for \$5,000 from the students. Another \$5,000 was presented to New Mexico State Chi Alpha as the newest group being pioneered in the South Central Area. After being on campus for only one semester, they were able to bring 11 students to the conference this year.

Chi Alpha Campus Ministries, U.S.A. began conducting SALT conferences across the country in 1972. This winter more than 4,100 students attended SALTs nationwide. This unprecedented involvement is representative of Chi Alpha's historic growth nationally in terms of numbers of campus ministries 311, affiliate leaders 771, and estimated national student involvement 28,083.

AFRICAN AMERICAN LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE EQUIPS STUDENTS TO LEAVE A LEGACY

When criticized by the religious establishment of his day for associating with tax collectors and sinners, Jesus responded with a simple story of a shepherd who left the majority of his sheep in the open country to look for one single sheep that had wandered off. It is core to the Gospel and the Kingdom to leave our comfort zone, trust the majority to fend for themselves and search for those on the outside. In the history of the U.S. and the Assemblies of God, one of the most overlooked and under sought groups of people are African Americans.

For this reason, the Great Lakes SALT Team decided to put together an event specifically for African American students as a pre-conference to our SALT called The African American Leadership Conference (AALC). "Legacy," our second AALC, was held January 1-2 with about 90 students and staff in attendance.

Rev. Sherman and Sadell Bradley, pastors of New Life Covenant Cincinnati, brought three powerful messages on understanding the past, leading the present and forging a legacy. Rev. Reggie Lenzy, worship pastor of People's Church Cincinnati, led us in amazing times of worship and praise.

In addition to the speaking sessions, the event included a marvelous Talent Showcase where students shared dance, songs, and spoken word. Sherman and Sadell also hosted a "pillow talk" where students could ask any questions regarding sexuality, relationships, and romance. Both of these times were powerfully used by God.

Something new we did this year was to put together a student planning team. I felt if we were serious about raising up leaders, we needed to give students leadership within the conference

itself. It was wonderful how God wove together each and every part of the conference and how all the leaders involved worked together seamlessly.

The students who attended this conference left as different people. "God began a process of healing for many in issues of identity, sexual abuse, the orphan spirit and financial freedom," says Sadell. "So many students and staff expressed that what was shared drastically changed their perspectives, made relevant the history and culture of African-Americans, and gave them tangible next steps on how to engage going forward."

There is little for us to be proud of when we look at the history of race relationships in our country and our fellowship. It's time we put forth serious effort in healing this breach wherever it is found.
