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

But our end goal isn't just to send short-term teams, it's to make disciples of all nations. That doesn't happen in two weeks. That's why our short-term missions teams must be a part of a big picture strategy. When they are, they can absolutely cultivate long-term fruit.

In 2008, my wife, one-year-old son, and I gave a year in Bangkok, Thailand, working with a career missionary and a local Thai church to establish campus ministry at a nearby university. Our Chi Alpha group at the University of Alabama also committed to send summer teams for five years.

When we arrived, there was no ongoing outreach to students. About a month after we got there, a team of our students and recent graduates from Alabama came. Because of the age and energy of this team, they were able to gather and connect with dozens of students during those two short weeks. To be sure, the missionary and Thai church were the backbone of the long-term strategy, but our shortterm team was a tremendous catalyst for the launch of that student ministry. What started from scratch became a group of around 30 students within six months. Several gave their lives to Christ in that time while others experienced a warm exposure to Christ.

As a movement that is becoming increasingly global, I believe that we can maximize the fruitfulness of our short-term missions teams if we let these three things inform our strategy:

- 1. Connect with our AG World Missionary partners: We are fortunate to be part of such an expansive missions movement within the Assemblies of God fellowship. This partnership affords us a wide range of opportunities, support, and accountability. Also, the National Chi Alpha staff is consistently dialoguing with regional and area leaders within AGWM, gaining awareness of existing missions opportunities as well as dreaming about how Chi Alpha Campus Ministries can help establish new ones.
- 2. Make a five-year commitment: While the five-year timeline is flexible, an extended commitment to the same area, people group, or missionary shouldn't be. There is a traction and momentum that happens when we send our students to the same ministry. We're communicating to our students and the missionaries we serve, that we want to be a part of building something, not just doing something. Building requires planning, foundation, and follow through. Additionally, I also believe a five-year commitment will increase the likelihood our students will give a year and pray about a lifetime and they will do so more effectively.



3. Invest in Campus Ministry: My good friend, Ronnie Hoover, whose ministry at the University of Arkansas spent ten years planting Chi Alpha ministries across the nation of Bolivia, says, "Chi Alpha students are uniquely equipped and qualified to reach and disciple university students." If we are going to leverage our resources to strategically advance God's Kingdom around the world, we have to make university student ministry a priority. No one can reach university students like university students. That doesn't mean that we never do anything else, but what could happen if Chi Alpha missionaries had a deliberate strategy to plant university student ministry around the world?

So, as we continue to go into all the world, let us do so with a Spirit empowered, kingdom building strategy.



This summer, our seven-member Longhorn XA team from the University of Texas at Austin will mark year two of our five-year commitment made at The World Missions Summit 3 (TWMS3) to serve Assemblies of God World Missionaries in Taiwan. But our trek to Taiwan began with a single step more than twenty-five years ago—a dream in God's heart to see His Kingdom advance among Taiwanese university students!

In 1990, I ate breakfast with a beloved missionary, Howard Kenyon, who was preparing for Chinese language school in Taiwan. I dreaded his inevitable question, which exposed a current reality, "Do you know any Taiwanese students?" Seven hundred Taiwanese students?" Seven dutted Taiwanese students represented UT's most populous nationality that year, so I sheepishly admitted that I didn't. I was dismayed, but prayed with determination, "Lord, You need to do something."

A few months later, AGWM missionary Brent N., chatted in the elevator with Ching-An, who became our first Taiwanese friend. Ching-An introduced us to one of her friends, who made the way for us to welcome 175 new Taiwanese students that Fall! We went from zero Taiwanese friends to having more than 50 deep relationships in a few months. Since then, Longhorn XA has maintained generations of new Taiwanese friendships every year!

In early December 2012, I officiated two dear friends' wedding in Tokyo, Japan. Being so close, I couldn't resist visiting Longhorn XA alumni in Taiwan. As the plane descended into Taoyuan Int'l Airport, I wept and thought, "I'm finally here." What a beautiful three days of seeing alumni spanning two decades!

Ronnie Hoover issued a challenge later that month at TWMS3, calling fellow campus missionaries and Chi Alpha groups to send Expeditions teams with a five-year commitment like his group does with Bolivia. Longhorn XA was ready, ripe and raced to nab the Taiwan material off a table as a declaration of our five-year commitment to this land! In the waning hours of TWMS3 among the throng of 4,000 plus participants, God intersected my path with long-time friends and missionaries Ty and Cina Sylva. The Sylvas catapulted our desire to serve Taiwan with a real relationship connection to our amazing AGWM missionary, Shannell Keck!

That breakfast moment in 1990 with Howard provoked us to love and perform good works. Longhorn XA friends have without exaggeration impacted a couple thousand Taiwanese students with the love of Jesus—while never even leaving Austin, Texas! So you see, long before we were in Taiwan, Taiwan was in us!

Without diminishing other nations' needs, I must conclude with an appeal to echo the cry for more laborers in Taiwan! Much like Howard asked me many years ago, "Will you and your spiritual community consider tangible ways to expand the Kingdom of God in Taiwan?" Even if your trek doesn't originate from Texas, come trek to Taiwan with us!

At the end of May, more than 30 nations were present at the annual All Nations conference, where international students came to Christ and were filled with the baptism in the Holy Spirit.

Paloma, a student from Brazil, shared this testimony after the conference: "The moment we arrived at the hotel for All Nations I felt something different. God's presence was already so strong that I knew He had prepared something special. All weekend I felt different. Everything I thought I was not good at, or the things that I never felt comfortable doing, God showed me that it's not about what I can or cannot do. It is about what He can do through me when I allow Him to lead my life and I am willing to obey Him. Also, it was really inspiring for me to worship God with people from many different countries, cultures, languages and backgrounds.

"As an international student, becoming a Christian in a place far away from home was very scary because I knew that eventually I will have to go back to my country, where I don't have Christian friends, where I didn't have a Christian life. But being with people from all over the world gave me a new

perspective on being a Christian. God taught me that being a Christian is not only about being a member of an awesome group at my University, but it is about being a part of something bigger. It is about being a member of a bigger family, and I don't need to be afraid. God has been changing my life and my heart even before All Nations, but at All Nations I felt God's presence as I had never felt. I never felt so happy and loved before. He gave me a purpose. He aave me strength and the desire to be even closer to Him and to serve Him."
