

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
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EDITOR'S LETTER

THE SOUND OF CHANGE

A strategic part of leadership is knowing things need to change and the ability to navigate it. Often it is said that the most important characteristic to making change is having the *courage* to make the shifts. But I would suggest *listening* is just as important because it gives you a guide as to what needs to change and when.

I have served in the capacity of senior director of Chi Alpha Campus Ministries, U.S.A. for just over five years. While serving as a Chi Alpha missionary for 27 years, I had been listening to our missionaries, leaders in Chi Alpha and The General Council, and strategic partners.

Listening gave me a window into how people perceived Chi Alpha at the local and national levels. Most importantly, I listened to the Holy Spirit. I knew I needed to clearly hear from Him to have the guidance in the areas that needed a change in Chi Alpha as a Movement.


I will highlight two changes I feel have deeply impacted Chi Alpha. Our first significant change made five years ago was a set of new leadership values in which we would process our speech, behavior, and attitude. These new values—honor, respect, unity, and prayer—were consistently and frequently articulated and repeated to our national Chi Alpha Movement. Our desire was that these values would assist us in walking in a godly posture and produce fruit of the Holy Spirit. The change was efficacious.

The second change revolves around religious vears, universities the nation across implemented policies that all registered student organizations could "discriminate" due to religious belief in selecting their leadership. What this meant for Chi Alpha is that our groups would be forced to permit a non-Christian to serve as a student leader, leading our prayer, Bible studies, and worship.

We would not compromise our position that to lead a Christian organization, you needed to be a Christian. The California State University system disagreed with us and we were swiftly derecognized and kicked off California State University-Stanislaus.

This led us to Capitol Hill in Washington D.C. to meet with congressmen and in multiple state congressional committee hearings. We were eventually permitted back on campus. and became a leader in protecting other campus groups. We also drafted an official belief document, best practices document, and added national standards and safeguards to our local ministry constitutions.

TESTIMONY: TESTIFYING TO THE TRUTH OF RELIGIOUS DISCRIMINATION

After over forty years of contribution to California State University-Stanislaus, Chi Alpha was derecognized as a student organization in September 2014. The derecognition was ordered and Chi Alpha was kicked off the campus when they refused to accept a policy that denied the local group the right to choose its leaders based on whether they believed in our mission and were Christian.

This issue quickly became national news and Chi Alpha under the guidance of Becket Law stepped into the forefront of the battle for religious liberty on the secular university. In an environment embedded in the doctrine of tolerance, it took courage to step up and defend Chi Alpha in light of the potential backlash. Bianca Travis, CSU-Stanislaus Chi Alpha's student president, came forth with valor and rallied other Chi Alpha students in defense of the ministry.



Bianca went to Capitol Hill in Washington D.C. and shared the dilemma of being discriminated against with select congressional leaders. She had the courage to be interviewed live for *Fox and Friends* where she became the face of religious liberty on the secular university. Following her efforts, the California State University System worked with Chi Alpha to enable the local group to be back on campus.



Bianca's willingness to testify to truth in a very challenging time led to significant change that has served Chi Alpha nationally as well as all religious student organizations on the secular university.
