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


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Your Post Academic Transition

From the very beginning, God had a purpose for Moses. God tasked Moses with leading the Israelites out of slavery and into the fruitful land He had promised them. During their journey, God was their guide. He did not let darkness and bright light distract their eyes from seeing which direction to walk. He was their constant navigator in their transition from where they were to where they were going.

"The Lord went ahead of them. He guided them during the day with a pillar of cloud, and He provided light at night with a pillar of fire. This allowed them to travel by day or by night. And the Lord did not remove the pillar of cloud or pillar of fire from its place in front of the people." Exodus 13:21-22 NLT

From the moment Jesus created you to this moment, (Ephesians 1:4) even before you stepped onto the plane to study in the United States, Jesus has had a specific purpose for you. Jesus is not a North American idea, and neither is your purpose. He continues to have a purpose for you even after your university studies. He will continue to use you in His kingdom during your Post Academic Transition and wherever He leads you. Just as He appointed Moses, He is appointing you for great things. Just as He guided the Israelites with fire and a cloud, He will be the constant source of direction in your life.

Your Post Academic Transition is the time after your university study, whether you go back home, go to another country, or stay here in America. Whether you continue with more study, work in the marketplace, or jump into full time ministry, Jesus is walking with you during your Post Academic Transition.

Why Prepare?

It is important to prepare for your Post Academic Transition. Experiences and living in different cultures influence and shape us. As you have lived here in the United States, studying, making memories, and serving Christ, you have become a different person. (Think Home).





"I think one of the most important things when we transition from being in American culture or coming to Christ in a different culture and going back to native culture, it almost feels like you're neither there nor you're neither here. Because you're not fully American, neither are you fully whatever culture you grew up in." He continues to say, "It's for me to create this culture of Christ, a cultural understanding of completely filling our lives with Christ and Christianity." – Former International Student who returned to India

The great news is, you are in God's culture, which never changes no matter where you are. Life will be different as you move on to new places and opportunities. The external culture will be different. Transition comes with its own set of challenges and experiences. It is vital to process, set realistic expectations and plan for what is to come and how you will respond and approach the new context where Jesus is leading you. What an exciting moment to bring God's culture into your new external culture!

How to Use this Guide

Once a compass points true North, only then can you know east, west, and south. Then, you can make decisions about which direction to go. Use this guide as a compass as you navigate through your Post Academic Transition. Allow Jesus to be your true North - to establish your east, west and south. Think of your compass as your modern-day fire at night and cloud by day, keeping your eyes fixed on Jesus as your constant source of direction toward the purpose and path He has for you.

Each chapter is written specifically with you in mind, with the purpose of equipping you and giving you tools to use now and in the future. From spending quality time with Jesus to making disciples in your new context, we want you to be prepared, cared for and strong, and able to apply what you have learned during your time studying overseas. **Spend time processing, pondering, and praying through each topic, question, and challenge. Use the writing space provided in this book. Sit with your leaders and talk through these topics. Share what God is speaking to you, and what you are feeling and thinking. There are themes common to everyone's journey that are important to walk through.**

Note: *Think Home* is an excellent resource filled with topics and questions to help process and prepare for your Post Academic Transition. It is written for someone who will be returning to their home country. Throughout this guide will be references to *Think Home*. Even if you are not returning to your home country, process *Think Home* though the lens of where you are going next!





Processing Transition

Where Are You Going?

As you begin your Post Academic Transition journey, it is important to look ahead to the potential direction you are trying to go. Look to Jesus as your true North and begin to process what is next for you. Will you be staying in the U.S. for more academic studies or a career? Are you moving to a different country? Will you be returning home? (Think Home).

What are your motivations for your move? Think through the examples below:




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The U Curve

As you needed to adapt to your new environment when you arrived in the U.S., you will need to adapt to your new environment in the next place Jesus is guiding you. Lysgaard (sociology professor from the University of Oslo, Norway) developed a tool to help describe the transition phenomenon, called the U-Curve. It describes different feelings that people experience when entering a new environment. This curve will vary person to person based on their experiences. (InterVarsity.com). (Think Home).

STAGES OF TRANSITION



One may actually experience several high and low points in each transition. Also, multiple and simultaneous "U" curves may be experienced, with academic adjustment happening at a different rate than social or emotional transition, for example.

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Processing Change

Change and growth is healthy. Just as you have changed as a person, you will continue to change as you develop more experiences in life. These changes also alter your perceptions. Understanding your current perceptions and how you have changed will prepare you to enter the next part of your life with more awareness and will help you set realistic expectations. Therefore, it is important to begin to prepare for your Post Academic Transition by evaluating how you have changed. (Home Again).

Your Post Academic Transition is a unique opportunity to trust God more and allow Him to move in your life. God has not forgotten you. So, when you face events in your new context that will be different from what you expected, God will be in the middle of it all. Nothing surprises Him. He has your life in His hands.

Discerning God's Voice

As you navigate your purpose and as God continues to use you in His kingdom, discerning His voice is very critical and important. If we cannot hear from Him, we cannot follow Him well. Life sometimes gets in the way of our relationship with God. Not only sin, but stress, transition into a new context, and the chaos of being in unfamiliar environments can put us in need of outside voices that remind us of God's voice. When we are embedded in Christian community, our fellow believers become an extension of God's voice speaking truth to us. But what happens when you find yourself as the only one for miles who knows God in your new context? Even if you have a few Christian friends, there may be challenges to being in community with them. Therefore, every believer should develop the ability to discern when and what God is speaking to them. Your prayer life must become more about what He is saying to you, than even what you are asking of Him to develop a hearing heart before God. If you do this, you can be directed by God into an abundant life. May we hear our Father clearly as we are in fellowship with Him. (Return to China).

Challenge: The Bible helps us fully discern God's voice. Read the Bible today and ask God to speak to you through it. What has God been speaking to you from the Bible recently?








Being a Disciple

As you move into your new context, you will have the grand opportunity to continue your discipleship journey. We see many prophets, apostles and servants of the Lord in Scripture working mighty miracles and living a power-filled life, no matter the context they were in. The expression of their faith frequently showed up in signs, wonders, and miracles. When we study the book of Acts, we find such examples in the lives of Stephen, John, Peter, James, Paul, and others. The outward manifestations of miracles were a testimony to the fact that these men had been with Jesus! (Acts 4:13) Through intense persecution, they stayed faithful. **Their strength through public trials came from stewarding their relationship** with Jesus. They were His disciples. They prayed, read, and relished the Word and stayed as obedient followers of Jesus. This kind of discipleship helps our faith stand the test of time and trials. As you begin to process your Post Academic Transition, it is key to continue learning how to be a disciple of Jesus in the context you are currently in and where you will be going.

- 1. What makes someone a disciple of Jesus? With your current spiritual habits in mind, do you consider yourself a disciple of Jesus?
- 2. What do you think gave the disciples in Acts the power to stay faithful to God through trials?



Challenge: What are some things in your life that currently help you be faithful to Jesus? What are some things in your life that are actively making it difficult to follow Jesus? After you have thought through the above questions, craft a specific, measurable, attainable, relevant, time-bound goal that will help you follow God. Below are some examples:

- Set a time during the day to devote 15 minutes to the reading of Scripture, and another 15 towards meditative prayer.
- 2. Choose a Christian book that might help you learn more about God and make it part of your weekly reading.
- 3. Spend time playing worship music and worshiping God a few times a week.
- 4. Fast and pray for situations that can only be helped by divine intervention.
- 5. Spend time listening to the Lord on walks outside, in your room, etc.

Using the above suggestions as guidelines, come up with your own way of continuing to be a disciple of Jesus. Commit, then call a mentor or friend to tell them about your commitment so they can be praying for you and cheering you on.







Making Disciples

Not only will you continue to be a disciple of Jesus, but you will also have the grand opportunity to be a disciple maker in your new context! The great commission commands each of us to go make disciples of all nations. During your academic years, you may have found the great commission easier to follow. Making disciples in your home nation or a new place may, however, be challenging compared to your previous experiences. Our hardships do not let us out of our obedience to do everything God asks of us. However, the way you disciple might change from being centered on small groups to individual conversations. The place you disciple might change from a dorm room to an office in your place of work. No matter what discipling others looks like in this season, it is our responsibility to look for opportunities to tell everyone we know about Jesus.

"But how can they call on him to save them unless they believe in him? And how can they believe in him if they have never heard about him? And how can they hear about him unless someone tells them?" Romans 10:14 NLT

- 1. When was the last time you actively shared your faith with someone?
- 2. In Matthew 10, Jesus is sending out the twelve disciples to go and declare that the Kingdom of heaven has come. He says in verse 16, "I am sending you out like sheep among wolves. Therefore, be as shrewd as snakes and as innocent as doves." What does it mean to be shrewd as serpents yet innocent as doves?
- 3. What are some legitimate threats to you if you share the gospel with people you know? Ask God for courage and clarity on when, how and with whom you may share about Him. Be obedient, but also wise. Based on your nation's receptivity to the good news it might be dangerous to tell others about Jesus. Ask God to make a way and give you favor with the people around you so that you can obey Him by discipling others.



Challenge: Write out a prayer to Jesus asking Him to bring people into your life now and in the future so you can share the Gospel with them. Ask Him for wisdom on how to share the Gospel in your new context. Ask Him to grow your heart for the people who do not know Him in your new context. Go a step further and begin to research how other people have shared the Gospel in your new context.

Spiritual Warfare

Even before you were born, there has been a fight raging over your eternal destiny in the heavenlies. When we give our lives to Jesus, we are immediately engaged in an epic battle. Forces that we cannot see or hear attempt to divert our attention from heaven to earthly things daily. God's enemy, the devil, hates us because we are dearly loved by God. He fashions accusations against us that separate us from others, until he separates us even from God. Even facing these realities, God has equipped us to be strong in the battle. **He won the victory over every spiritual battle on the cross.** But just because the victory is won, doesn't mean the devil will leave the territory he has lost. The fight continues even though the battle is over. Paul talks about putting on the full armor of God and being ready for battle in Ephesians Chapter 6. We must put on this armor and continue to enforce the victory of God in our lives. In 2 Timothy 2:1, Paul says to Timothy his spiritual son, "So you then my son, be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus." (NIV). As a disciple of Jesus, you are a great asset in the victorious fight!

The strength that Paul calls for here is not merely internal strength, but strength given to you because of God's grace. Wherever God sends you, you will find times where your strength is lacking. Adapting to new weather patterns, pace of life, or getting re-accustomed to the food if you return to your country could take great effort. Your family may consciously or subconsciously wear you down because you became a disciple of Christ in the U.S. All these things are prime opportunities for the enemy to mount spiritual battles against you. But it is also an opportunity for you to rely on God, to stay strong in the faith and pray until He delivers you. God cares more about molding you into Christlikeness, refining your character, and perfecting your faith, than merely ensuring your comfort.

- 1. What are the most spiritually, physically, and emotionally taxing things you are expecting to face as you head into your Post Academic Transition?
- 2. How do you react when you experience push back or opposition to you being a person of faith?



Challenge: Have you experienced spiritual warfare? Pray and ask God to deliver you. Call or text a trusted mentor or friend and ask them to keep praying for you until God's help arrives on your behalf.



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Living in Obedience

Jesus tells His disciples in John 14:15 that to love Him is to obey Him. Obedience has a negative connotation in a world that aches for personal expression and freedom from authority, especially in the Western context. God's way of keeping us safe, happy and in Him are all directly connected to how well we obey Him. As we read Scripture and pray, obedience is key to hearing Him clearly and often. As you move from where you are now to where Jesus is leading you, obeying Him will bring fruitfulness and direction. However, as you leave behind the Christian community that has supported you during your student years, it might be harder to obey God. Everything in your future situation may go against the grain of God's word. It takes a resolute heart to stay strong and obey God when the obedience could make our situation uncomfortable, cost us our reputation or bring us rejection.

God is aware of these things and the sacrifice it would take for you to fully follow Him. 1 Samuel 15:22 says, "to obey is better than sacrifice." (NIV). There is nothing more pleasing to God than obedience. There is nothing that will bring you closer to God than obedience. Obedience is God's love language.

- 1. Do you find it easy to obey God? What stands in the way of you obeying God fully in this season?
- 2. What do you think will stand in the way of you obeying God fully in your upcoming new season?
- 3. What are some costs you have already paid to obey God? How did God meet you? Did you experience any positive benefits from your obedience?



Challenge: As internationals, the fear of man is the foremost reason we disobey God. Prayerfully consider your fears that keep you from obeying God. Bring them before the Lord in prayer and ask Him to help you overcome those fears and help you be a bold follower of Jesus.

"Fearing people is a dangerous trap, but trusting the Lord means safety." Proverbs 29:25 NLT






Experiencing the Holy Spirit

Scripture calls the Holy Spirt a helper, who will teach and guide you. "But the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, he will teach you all things and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you." John 14:26 ESV. The Holy Spirit is available to you. He wants to guide you and be your source of strength through all the changes, challenges, and excitement of your Post Academic Transition.

Every believer is drawn to God by the Holy Spirit. Without the Spirit's wooing, you and I could have never become part of God's family. There is a greater fellowship we can have with the third person of the Godhead through the baptism of the Holy Spirit. This baptism is an immersion in the fullness of the person of God. It allows you to be filled from the inside out, with the power of God to know His will and to do His will. The sign of speaking in tongues usually accompanies the baptism in the Holy Spirit, but the most discernible change is the empowerment and enabling to be witnesses of Jesus. The Holy Spirit changes us internally so that day by day we become more like Jesus.

The baptism in the Holy Spirit is a free gift of God given to all believers (Acts 2:38-39). If you have not been baptized in the Holy Spirit, know that it is your portion as a child of God promised to you by the Father. God simply gives you the gift as you pray and ask Him persistently.

BEING FULL OF THE SPIRIT

The book of Acts begins with the last words of Jesus to His disciples before He ascended to the Father. With His last words, Jesus addresses the importance of being filled with the Spirit. Jesus considered this a prerequisite to being a witness to Him in their own homes, their towns, their countries and the nations. He exhorted the disciples to wait and pray for the baptism in the Holy Spirit to fall upon them. As they prayed, the Spirit fell, and the new church emerged with the fire of the Holy Spirit in her. Even today God wants to fill each of us with His Spirit. While a portion of His Spirit is given as a deposit to us as we become believers, the baptism of the Spirit is an immersive experience in the Spirit of God that marks us for life and ministry. The first initiates our journey of faith, the second empowers our journey.

SCRIPTURE: READ THE FOLLOWING SCRIPTURES ALOUD.

LUKE 11:9-13 And I tell you, ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds, and to the one who knocks it will be opened. What father among you, if his son asks for a fish, will instead of a fish give him a serpent; or if he asks for an egg, will give him a scorpion? If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!

JOHN 7:37-39 On the last day of the feast, the great day, Jesus stood up and cried out, "If anyone thirsts, let him come to me and drink. Whoever believes in me, as the Scripture has said, 'Out of his heart will flow rivers of living water."" Now this he said about the Spirit, whom those who believed in him were to receive, for as yet the Spirit had not been given, because Jesus was not yet glorified.

ACTS 2:17 And in the last days it shall be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit on all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams.

OBSERVATION

1. In Luke 11:9-13, what is Jesus instructing us to ask for? What will happen if we ask for this?

2. In John 7:37-39, what happens to those who believe in Jesus?

3. Putting these two scriptures together what do we need to do to be baptized in the Holy Spirit?

4. In the last days what does Acts 2:17 say the Spirit will be poured out on?

All Sons and Daughters

The baptism in the Holy Spirit is an empowering experience that equips us to be better witnesses to Jesus' death and resurrection life. It is a recurring immersive experience for a Christian who believes God and has asked and waited on Him to be baptized in the Spirit. God makes no special demands or restrictions to receive the baptism. His desire is that all His sons and daughters receive the fullness of the Spirit. We must desire as He desires and ask with faith for us and every believer to be baptized by His Spirit.



If you have been Baptized in the Holy Spirit, spend some time today praying in your prayer language. If you have not been baptized in the Holy Spirit, reach out to a mentor or pastor who has experienced this and ask them any questions you may have about the Baptism in the Holy Spirit.

\Lambda PRAY

Spend time praying for the fullness of the Spirit of God to be present in you. Petition God for more of Him, and ask Him to reveal things that hinder you from walking in the fullness of God. Make a decision as you pray to repent and turn away from these things.

Share with a Christian friend your discoveries about the baptism in the Holy Spirit. Who will you share this with?

Challenges

As an international student, you had the privilege to leave home and study in the U.S. The experiences you've gained, the relationships you've built, the ways you have been stretched and challenged have all made for a rich experience. Sometimes, looking back, you can see that the times you grew the most were the most challenging seasons. You have learned to lean on God for wisdom, help, and strength to face any difficulty you've encountered in your time here. As you prepare to transition, it is important to prepare your heart and mind for the challenges you will face where you're going next as well. There will be unique challenges, but thankfully God remains the same. Jesus wanted us believers to know that just because we follow Him, it doesn't mean life will always be easy. In John 16:33 NIV, He says, "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." You are to "count the cost" of living for Jesus in a different, perhaps more challenging, environment. As you do so, remember that this world is not your home; Heaven is! And Jesus has already defeated sin and death and done the hard work for us!

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Tough Questions

What does it mean to count the cost? In Philippians 3:7-11, Paul writes about how losing everything would be worth it, as long as he could know Christ. Paul knew challenges and hardships and what it meant to suffer for Jesus. This passage says he would face any hardship for the reward of relationship and intimacy with Jesus. (Think Home).

"I once thought these things were valuable, but now I consider them worthless because of what Christ has done. Yes, everything else is worthless when compared with the infinite value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have discarded everything else, counting it all as garbage, so that I could gain Christ and become one with him. I no longer count on my own righteousness through obeying the law; rather, I become righteous through faith in Christ. For God's way of making us right with himself depends on faith. I want to know Christ and experience the mighty power that raised him from the dead. I want to suffer with him, sharing in his death, so that one way or another I will experience the resurrection from the dead!"

Philippians 3:7-11 NLT

As you think about hardships and difficulties you may face as a believer in your next season of life, try to use this same lens that Paul used. Believe that any trials you face will draw you closer to Jesus and will be worth the reward of knowing Him, both in this life and in Heaven. This doesn't mean you shouldn't work through potential questions and problems, but it does mean you can face the answers to those tough questions with the strength, hope, and promises Jesus gives us in His Word. He will be with you to help you navigate the tough situations. He offers peace. Your friendship with Him is your greatest asset as you face any challenge of life.

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People and Relationships

We are social beings, and God created us to be in relationship with others. Your relationships will be critical to your success as you transition out of a student environment. However, as a believer, your relationships may look different from before as you count the cost with relatives and friends who disregard or discourage your faith. Rejection and even hostility are painful realities that many face. (Think Home).

- 1. What will you do if you find yourself rejected by the people you love most?
- 2. Will you be able to find support and friendship in a local church?
- 3. Do you have a small group of people you could count on to help you with housing or finding a job if your family or employer cuts you off?
- 4. What will you do if your boss asks you to work on Sundays or if he/she expects you to do something illegal or that contradicts biblical principles?

These are difficult questions to work through, but always remember that the power of the Holy Spirit gives you the grace and wisdom you need for any and every

situation. When you choose to honor God above pleasing others (Gal. 1:10), He will reward you and use those choices to influence others. Though people in your life may not support your decision to follow Christ, it is important to pray for them and ask God to help you forgive and love them intentionally. Jesus truly wants everyone to know Him, and you may be the only example they have of someone who loves Jesus. Remember, He is worthy of any cost you may have to pay, for He has paid the ultimate cost for you. What you gain with Christ is better than anything the world has to offer.

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Embracing Joy in Transition

The Apostle Paul wrote four books of the New Testament (Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon) while he was in prison. This man endured isolation, beatings, and much suffering because of his bold witness for Christ. Yet, through it all, he kept such a joyous perspective and was the one encouraging others (through his letters) while alone in his cell. It is inspiring to read about the joy and contentment he had even when his circumstances were terrible. He knew what it meant to suffer for Christ. He knew the glory that was to come. He knew that even through the persecution, Jesus would be victorious in the end. When you suffer for Christ during hardship, He brings life and the opportunity to share the Gospel.

"Dear friends, do not be surprised at the fiery ordeal that has come on you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you. But rejoice in as much as you participate in the sufferings of Christ, so that you may be overjoyed when His glory is revealed. If you are insulted because of the name of Christ, you are blessed, for the Spirit of glory and of God rests on you. If you suffer, it should not be as a murderer or thief or any other kind of criminal, or even as a meddler. However, if you suffer as a Christian, do not be ashamed, but praise God that you bear that name. For it is time for judgment to begin with God's household; and if it begins with us, what will the outcome be for those who do not obey the gospel of God? And "If it is hard for the righteous to be saved, what will become of the ungodly and the sinner? "So then, those who suffer according to God's will, should commit themselves to their faithful Creator and continue to do good." 1 Peter 4:12-19 NIV

As you transition to where God is guiding you, keep in mind that even when circumstances are difficult or not what you expected, God has joy for you as you return as well! Think of what it will be like to enjoy your favorite foods again, not have to translate everything from English, and enjoy relaxation time with family and friends you've grown up with. Remember that your family will be excited and enjoy you returning home, too, so soak up the attention and joy of reconnecting with them! You can embrace this transition as an assignment from God and ask Him to equip you with everything you need, including joy! He is sovereign and He will lead you and work His purposes in and through you. Learn to love what He loves and see others the way He does. God loves your family and your friends, and you can enjoy this opportunity to see them in a new light, not only as people who you love, but who God dearly loves as well.

Being with Jesus

You may return to a culture where the values are not the same as American values. You may go to a brand-new culture or continue in American culture. You may hear your native language being spoken at home, at work or in the grocery store. Church may be different! How Christians gather, where they gather, and how they worship will probably not look the same as it does on your campus. **Despite all these differences, there is one major factor that will not change when you return, Jesus will be with you. Not only that, but He will also be the same God you have come to know in the United States.**

Jesus promised His disciples—and He promises us—to be with us wherever we go. We always have direct access to our King! Therefore, spending daily time with Jesus is vital. When we spend daily time with Jesus, sitting in His presence, praying, and reading His words, we are reminded that we are not alone. We gain a fresh perspective that Jesus' power, presence, and peace are what we need when many other things have changed. As you prepare to commit to abide with Jesus, remember that Jesus speaks your language. He doesn't need a translator! If you are not already doing it, start experimenting with praying in your own language and reading a translation of the Bible in your language.

"Remain in me, and I will remain in you. For a branch cannot produce fruit if it is severed from the vine, and you cannot be fruitful unless you remain in me." John 15:4 NLT

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Connecting with Local Believers

Finding a community of believers when you move home may be challenging. There may be fewer churches, which are harder to find. Because of security issues, you may have to take certain steps before you are invited to a church. Like Ryota, you may have to travel a great distance to get to church. If you are going to face these challenges and commit to prioritizing community, you must firmly believe that community is vital to your faith.

Why is community so important? First, when we are trying to learn how to follow Jesus in a new environment, it is helpful to have disciplers who can show us the way and encourage us. You will face different questions and challenges as you live for Jesus at home or in a completely new place. It is important to have friends who can offer prayer, wisdom, and encouragement. Second, being in community provides the opportunity to serve. God knows we work better together as a team. When you bring your gifts and passions to your Christian community, you will be able to do things for God's kingdom that you could never do alone. God wants community for you, and He will provide it as you seek Him. (Think Home).

"And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds." Hebrews 10:24 NIV

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Taking Responsibility to Share Christ

Ryota described our spiritual responsibility as "miracle growth" to our souls. There is an excitement and joy that we experience when we join God in His mission to take the Gospel to the ends of the earth. God has designed you for this exact purpose. He created you and placed you in your home culture as a child. Then, God brought you to the United States, where you encountered Him and where your life was radically changed! Now, God is sending you in your Post Academic Transition, to a place where your friends, family, and coworkers desperately need the Gospel. At one point in your life, you had not encountered Jesus and had no good news to share. Now you have ultimate hope and peace in Christ to share with those you love!

This responsibility is best lived out alongside your community of believers wherever God sends you. Learning the best ways to share the Gospel in your new context will take time, and those who have experience will be of great help. Sharing the Gospel is also a spiritual exercise. **The ultimate battle we face is not fought with words or actions, but with prayers and faith.** As a community you will need to pray together often for the souls of those you tell about Jesus. When you do this, you will be amazed by how the Holy Spirit moves.

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Biblical Foundations

God's vision for creation is something called the Kingdom of God. God's goal and desire is that everyone, everywhere worship Him and live submitted to His will. As we live in God's kingdom, we live according to His truth and His purpose for our life. Most cultures do not operate in the same way as the Kingdom of God. Your home culture may have different values, beliefs, and ideas about truth. As you interact with people from your home culture and other cultures, you will be faced with a question: Will you live as a son or daughter in the Kingdom of God, or will you live as a resident of the kingdom of the culture in which you live?

If you are going to resist the continual pull of the culture around you towards drifting from living in the Kingdom of God, you need to be firmly grounded in the Truth. You need to be reminded of who God is. Here are some things about who God is for you to consider. (Home Again).

> He is in control. He is powerful. His love is perfect. He is the Creator. He is your Savior.

When you remember how big God is, the world will seem a little smaller in comparison. You also need to be reminded of who you are.

You are a child of God. You are loved unconditionally. You are filled with the Holy Spirit.

Your value, identity, and worth is not based on your level of approval or performance. You are free to fully live in God's kingdom and not go along with the world. If you remain grounded in the truth of who God is and who you are, you will thrive wherever God sends you.

"Don't copy the behavior and customs of this world, but let God transform you into a new person by changing the way you think. Then you will learn to know God's will for you, which is good and pleasing and perfect." Romans 12:2 NLT

Spending daily time with Jesus, studying, and memorizing Scripture, and reading from Christian authors are all essential ways to grow in your knowledge of the truth. I recommend talking to your discipler about good resources to take with you, as well as learning about what resources will be accessible to you after you graduate.

Having a Kingdom Mindset

During His time on earth, Jesus taught us about the Kingdom of God. He taught that in our daily lives there will be many things that may cause worry and stress. This can be true during your Post Academic Transition and beyond. However, He also promised as we seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness that God will help us with our transitions, stress, and worries. (Matt 6:31-34). God is our king, He rules over every aspect of our lives our social position, work, family, and all decisions we make. He asks us to seek Him in all these areas and to live by the values of the kingdom in every situation.

In addition, He has given you specific skills and abilities that you can use in His Kingdom. Maybe you are very good at coding or design or another professional skill. Each of us also has a set of interpersonal skills that can help us to interact with people and build strong relationships. Some of our talents and abilities bring joy to our lives and the lives of others such as when someone can play beautiful music or cook delicious meals to share.

Leading with Influence

You may find a difference in how people from your home community perceive you as you graduate from a university in the United States. You may have a better job, more money and more influence than you have had before and maybe more than many others in your community have. It may be easy to have an attitude of superiority toward your community because of your experience abroad. However, Jesus taught that kingdom leadership comes from a position of serving others and not from superior knowledge or position.

The key is living out this kingdom value in a way that communicates love and service to others as you graduate and move into positions of leadership and influence. Your heart of service will need to be communicated in different ways depending on the culture you are entering.

Jesus called the Twelve and said, "Anyone who wants to be first must be the very last, and the servant of all." Mark 9:35 NIV

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Being a Christian at Home

1 Timothy 3:1-7 gives some instructions about how Christian leaders should act at home. Whether you return home to visit or to live after you graduate, you will need to navigate how to share your relationship with Jesus with your family. You may be returning to a very supportive family environment or may face a lot of opposition or rejection from your family for choosing to follow Christ. As you navigate loving and honoring your family and walking in obedience to Christ, being a Christian at home can require a lot of strength and courage from the Holy Spirit. As you submit to Christ every day, pray that He will help you reflect His character in your family relationships, especially when it is difficult. Also pray that your life will be lived in a way that leads your family members to desire a relationship with Christ. (Returnee Handbook).

Honoring Parents and Obeying God

As Christians we have an identity as the sons and daughters of God. (Galatians 3:26) However, God also wants us to continue to build a good relationship with our parents and other people who are in our family. If your parents are not believers, (and sometimes even when they are) you will need to navigate obeying God and honoring your parents when these seem to be in conflict.

It is important that honor be an attitude of the heart that expresses itself in words and actions. If you can share your commitment to follow Jesus in words first, and then express this through your heart and actions, this has the advantage of giving your family the reason for some of the commitments you have or some of the changes in your life. Serving in small things that your parents would appreciate such as remembering to call, doing dishes, or picking up something for them at the store can communicate that you love and honor them. It is also important to show gratitude for everything they do for you.

If honoring your parents in your culture would involve doing something that would cause you to be disobedient to Christ, then obedience to Christ is the first commitment of a



Christian. You can explain with humility why you cannot do what your parents are asking or set limits on how you will participate while communicating that you still value the relationship and quality time with them. Do not be afraid if you experience opposition or persecution. God will be with you. Setting the bar at the beginning for what you will or won't do as a follower of Christ and then being consistent with this, can be helpful so people will know what to expect. Even if your family does not understand or is angry at first, if you persist in your obedience to Christ and your love and service to them, often, over time, you can have a good relationship, respecting one another.

It is worth the time and effort to research and understand God's heart for those topics. You may find some values in your work culture are very different from those of God's kingdom. Then, through prayer and discernment, you can find practical ways to live these kingdom values through your job. Here are some Scriptures to start your study.



Godly Decision Making

Sometimes it is tempting to separate our lives into 'spiritual' things such as reading the Bible and prayer and not see the spiritual impact of the other aspects of our lives. However, every decision that you make as a believer can have a spiritual impact in your life and the lives of others. As you live for the King of Kings, where you decide to work and live, who you spend time with, how you spend your money and who you marry are all kingdom decisions. "Don't copy the behavior and customs of this world, but let God transform you into a new person by changing the way you think. Then you will learn to know God's will for you, which is good and pleasing and perfect." Romans 12:2 NLT As you make decisions through prayer, fasting and the solid foundation of God's word, you will build a life in Christ that can withstand the stress of any future changes and transitions. (Matt 7:24-27)

Jesus affirmed things about His culture that were good and spoke highly of how the culture followed God's law. However, he was also willing to confront people and culture when they placed cultural practices above Kingdom values.

"Woe to you, teachers of the law and Pharisees, you hypocrites! You give a tenth of your spices-mint, dill, and cumin. But you have neglected the more important matters of the law-justice, mercy, and faithfulness. You should have practiced the latter, without neglecting the former." Matthew 23:23

Creating a Plan of Action

Post Academic Connection Form

Is God sending you to a new place or back to your home country? As you move from your Chi Alpha community to a different context, we want you to be connected with a community of local believers. We have relationships with people who love Jesus and are wanting to welcome you and be a contact for you as you transition to the new place. Work with your Chi Alpha leader and ask them to submit a connection form.

It is important to plan for your Post Academic Transition. However, as we make plans, it is also important to hold your plans loosely and give them to Jesus. Look to Him as your true north and ask Him for direction each step of the way. Prepare with a heart posture of letting Him lead you - even if it is not where you originally thought you would go.

Plan to Finish Your Current Season Well

As God leads you towards the next season of your life, one of the best things you can do to set yourself up for success is to finish well in the place where you have been. Are you serving in a leadership role? Then finish your commitment faithfully and communicate clearly to your current team about where God is leading you next and when you will be stepping down. Continue seeking the Lord through the transition and find time even when you are busy for the people who have been there for you during your university years. Take some time to rest and reflect before you jump into new roles and experiences. (Think Home).

Your community should be the ones sending you to the new place and season of life, if possible, talk with your leadership about a good time for a sendoff with a commissioning prayer. Have them pray for your future ministry and for the new relationships that you will have in the next season. Identify key relationships who will continue to support you through the next few months as you get settled in the new place.

Plan your Time with Jesus in Your New Place

During times of transition, your rhythm of life will change, or will possibly be very irregular for a while until you start a job or settle into a new routine. During these times, it can be hard to find a consistent time for prayer and reading Scripture. As best as you can, think through what the next couple of months will look like and plan for consistent time with the Lord. (Think Home).

Devotional Plan

Two words that can help you during your daily prayer and Bible reading time are PRAY and SOAP.

PRAY can help you as you pray and spend time with the Lord.

- **P:** Praise Start your time with the Lord in thanksgiving and praise.
- **R:** Repent Confess any sins or attitudes that need to change and ask for forgiveness.
- A: Ask Bring any concerns or requests for yourself or others.
- Y: Yield Surrender to the Lord and listen to anything He wants to speak to You.

SOAP is a method that can help you in your reading of Scripture

- **S:** Scripture Read a portion of the Bible.
- **O:** Observe what is happening in the text and what it says about God and people.
- A: Apply what you see in the scripture to your own life.
- **P:** Pray Ask God to help you live out what you read in the Scripture.





Plan Your Connection to Local Believers in the New Place

A new church or fellowship will not be the same as the one you experienced during your time in Chi Alpha. Approach your new church or fellowship with the expectation that things may be different and probably difficult at first. When Ryota went back to Japan, he had to travel two hours to attend church and the church was filled with people older than him. It was very different from his experience in Chi Alpha. However, connecting with local believers is vital for your spiritual health. We are called to be a part of the community. You will grow and be more fruitful by making the effort to be part of a church wherever God sends you.

"So, in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others." Romans 12: 5 NIV

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Plan for Representing Christ and Sharing Him with Others

Claire was an international student from Kenya who studied in India. She came to know Christ in India, and returned to Kenya, where she was able to share Christ with her family, help start a church that would plant many other churches and be a Godly influence in her military position. Being a life-long disciple maker does not happen by accident. Begin praying into who God is going to send into your life as you transition to a new place of ministry. If you do not plan for ministry, you will find that you do not have time for it with your work and family responsibilities. At the same time, you need to give yourself grace as you experience many unexpected changes and adjust to your new place. (Think Home).

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As you have read and reflected through these chapters, you have had time to process where you are going next, and what some of the challenges and changes will be. Hopefully this has been encouraging and helpful for you as you prepare for the next part of your journey. As you transition from where you have been a student to a new job or to a new place, it is natural to be both excited for what will come next, while at the same time, feeling sad about what you are leaving behind.

We are praying for you, believing that Jesus is sending you on purpose and that you will be a life-long disciple maker who will see transformation in your family, community, and nation. Go in the peace and power of Christ, overcome the challenges, and continue to hear His voice. As you focus on following Christ, your true North wherever He guides you, you will experience the joy of what God wants to do through you as you reflect His glory to the nations. What a joy it is to follow Jesus! What a joy it is to live a life full of Him!






Commissioning Prayer
